

Wessington War Memorials Group has existed under the banner of the U3A for some 5 years but research started about 12 years ago.

The idea was to find out about the 383 men (and one woman) named on the village war memorials at Fatfield, Washington and Usworth. In order to commemorate the centenary of the outbreak of war a scheme was devised to mark houses and buildings, from which men left and to which they did not return, with a bronze-resin poppy.



Designed and made by local artist and sculptor, Allan Scott, 76 of the poppies were funded by Sunderland City Council and 24 by Heritage Lottery Fund. Householders have each been given an individual, hand-painted In Memoriam card with details and photographs of the man who lived in their house.

The walk has been devised to follow a route which crosses Washington, connecting the three memorials and telling the stories of around 30 of the men who are commemorated. It is, of course, possible to follow many different routes since there are 100 poppies to locate. Details of any of the men so commemorated are available by accessing wwmp.weebly.com or

The Poppies

1. St George's Church,


4 Vigo Lane, Washington NE38 9AH

Find the poppy on the inside of the right hand arched gatepost. Inside the church is a marble plaque listing 93 men who died. However, there are 102 great war names on Harraton Memorial. St George's also has a roll of honour naming those 410 who fought. There is a stained glass window in the church and there is a table in memory of Fred Nicholson.

2. Fatfield House

Vigo Lane, Washington NE38 9AA

Find the poppy in the driveway on a stone with a horseshoe beside it in memory of Gunner William Taylor Dunn, RFA, 23/1/18 buried at Nine Elms. He was appealed for by the farmer of Fatfield House and given a stay but then had to enlist. He was a horse-man at the farm.

3. River Bar

Bonemill Lane, Washington NE38 8AJ

Co-op as was, is now the River Bar. The poppy is on the wall to the right of the entrance. Fred Nicholson, died of wounds, 11/5/17 at Etaples, was manager of the drapery department in the Co-op. Wallace Layfield, killed 24/9/18, buried at Trefcon Cemetery, also worked there, lived at Biddick Terrace, and is listed on Harraton and Washington Memorials.

4. Harraton War Memorial

Bonemill Lane, Washington

There is no bronze-resin poppy here, but the stone that stood on top of the block is at the back, having been replaced by a new Celtic Cross in 2012. The memorial has various features worth noting; eg. not all the names were incised at the same time.

5. South View

Fatfield, Washington

There are 5 bronze-resin poppies in South View Dr Anderson, Michael Kelly, John William Noble and A Brown. Dr Anderson lived in one

property and owned another so it is actually only four soldiers.



6. Wormhill Terrace

Fatfield, Washington

At number 24, Ernest Smith killed 7/9/17, aged 19, buried at Mendinghem and at 30, Fred Nicholson (see Co-op).

7. North Biddick Lodge

Biddick Lane, Washington

This is the Lodge of Cook's Hall and the poppy is on the front wall beside the door. It can be seen from the pavement. At least 9 men from Cook's died in the Great War, these included Norman Hall, Robert House, Stephen Mills, Richard Drummond, Alfred Braban, Robert Gould, George Smith, Charles Smith, John F Potter.

8. 22 The Parade

Washington NE38 7DP

There is a bronze poppy beside the front door to remember Joseph Humble 10/1/16, commemorated on Thiepval.

9. Emmerson Terrace


Washington NE38 7LN

There are poppies at numbers 9, 11 and 15. Hugh Gardner 11/1/16, Menin Gate, lived at number 9, George Forster 16/8/17, Arras Memorial at 11 and Sam Baggott 26/3/18, Pozieres Memorial at 15.

10. Westwood Club

Washington NE38 7LN

The club is opposite the houses named in Emmerson Terrace. The Club's poppy is just to the left of the front door. Inside the Westwood Club there are 2 memorials - one is specifically about the Great War and lists the 35 members who were killed and all those who served. The other refers to the Great War but includes only one or two men who actually fought in that war and the rest are men who served in WW2.



Etherlea House is down the street opposite the school. Stephen Charles Self lived there and died 9/4/18, as a Prisoner Of War in Germany. Buried in Berlin South West Cemetery.

12. Glebe Crescent

Washington NE38 7AW

There are 4 poppies in Glebe Crescent. Richard Jameson 22/12/17, Kantara Cemetery, was a Science Teacher at Washington School and lived at number 5. There was a memorial to him in Washington School. Thomas Wiseman 31/12/15, buried at Houplines, lived at 11 and Richard Laws 15 DLI, 1/7/16, Thiepval at 45. Ernest Coxon, a sailor, 17/10/17, Chatham Naval Memorial, HMS Mary Rose sunk by German cruisers off Norway, lived at 55. Each poppy is beside the front door of the house.

13. Washington Old Hall

The Avenue, Washington NE38 7LE

William Robinson, a cartman, killed 4/12/16, when his spade detonated a grenade, lived in Orchard House. Commemorated on Thiepval. Hugh Gardner lived at Northampton House (see 9 Emmerson Terrace) and John McLahaney, 15 DLI, 1/7/16, Thiepval, lived in the Old Hall, then tenements and somewhat run down. Each of the families would have been awarded a tribute medal by the Parish. It bears the Washington coat of arms.


14. Washington Cemetery

Glebe Crescent, Washington NE38 7AW

In the cemetery find: RT Simm, John T Douglas (wounded and his case discussed by CLS RDC,) John Bannister, George Golden, Robert Jefferson - all of whom died at home.

15. Washington Village War Memorial


The Green, Washington

The war memorial was opened in June 1920 by Earl of Durham. There are 179 names from Great War.

16. Village Lane

Washington

Ralph Hopson 16 Northumberland Fusiliers, 1/7/16. Thiepval, his poppy is on the wall beside the archway leading to Number 14. Upstairs is a private snooker and billiards club called The Farmer's.



Washington NE38 7HY

The pub has a poppy to the right of the left hand door, entrance into the bar. William Mason, 15 DLI, 8/10/18, Vis-en-Artois Memorial and his cousin, Edward Thompson 1/10/16, Becourt, lived there. There is a wall display in the bar.

18. Musgrave Terrace

Washington NE38 7HR

There are 4 poppies in Musgrave Terrace. At 24, Roseworth House, home of William J Marley, 9/6/18, Pernes. At 17, John Bannister - he died of tuberculosis at home and is buried in Washington Cemetery, Robert Thompson 26/9/15, Noeux les Mines, lived at number 15 and Bartholomew Redhead Varley, 16/3/16, Ration Farm Cemetery, son of Washington Cemetery Superintendent at number 10.



19. Council Terrace, Spout Lane

Washington NE37 2UD

Robert H Ross, 29/9/17, Mendinghem, Irish Guards, lived at 85 Spout Lane, the poppy is on 83A. On the other side of the street John T Sandy lived at 3 Council Terrace, died of wounds, 4/7/16, buried at Daours Cemetery.

20. Washington School


139 Spout Lane NE37 2AA

Richard Jameson (see Glebe Cres) taught Science here. The poppy is on the old wall before you reach the school's current entrance.

21. Old Police Station

Spout Lane, Washington NE37 2AA

This was the site of the Miners Welfare. There are no poppies on these buildings but is worth a mention.



Washington DH3 1AB

Robert Stanners, Gunner, RHA, 6/6/18, Marfaux Cemetery, lived at 6 Holyoake Terrace and walked to work at the Co-op which is 30 yards along the street. There is a poppy beside the front door of 6 Holyoake Terrace and another on Washington Co-op. On the Co-op the poppy is just to the right of the main front door, outside.

23. Miners Memorial

Victoria Road, Concord.

Around 71% of men from Washington were coal miners, the same figure applied to Harraton but in Usworth around 80% of those killed were miners.

24. The 'F' Pit Memorial

Washington "F" Pit NE37 1BN

Walking up Blue House Lane you come to the roundabout at the end of Pit Road. F Pit Museum now houses the memorial to the **64** employees of that pit, killed in the Great War. Several men are not named on the three local memorials.

25.Thomas Henry Cann Aged Miners Homes

Blue House Lane, Washington NE37 2TL

Messrs Lomax (Rector of Holy Trinity) and Begg (Rector of Usworth) are among the worthies named on the plaques on these cottages.

26. Usworth Rectory

Well Bank Road, Washington NE37 1NW

This was the home of Alexander JB Begg, 22nd Northumberland Fusiliers (Tyneside Scots) missing from March 21st 1918, Thiepval. Several letters from his father, asking for confirmation and details of AJB's death, are available from the latter's service record. The poppy is on the right stone gatepost outside.

27. 3 Stone Cellars Road

Washington NE37 1NS

Isaac Ellwood, Royal Naval Division. Killed at Gallipoli 4/6/15, Helles Memorial.



28. Holy Trinity Church

Peareth Hall Road, Washington, NE37 1NR
Inside is a bronze plaque detailing the 121 men
from Usworth killed in the war. The memorial was
unveiled in February 1922 by Bishop of Durham.
